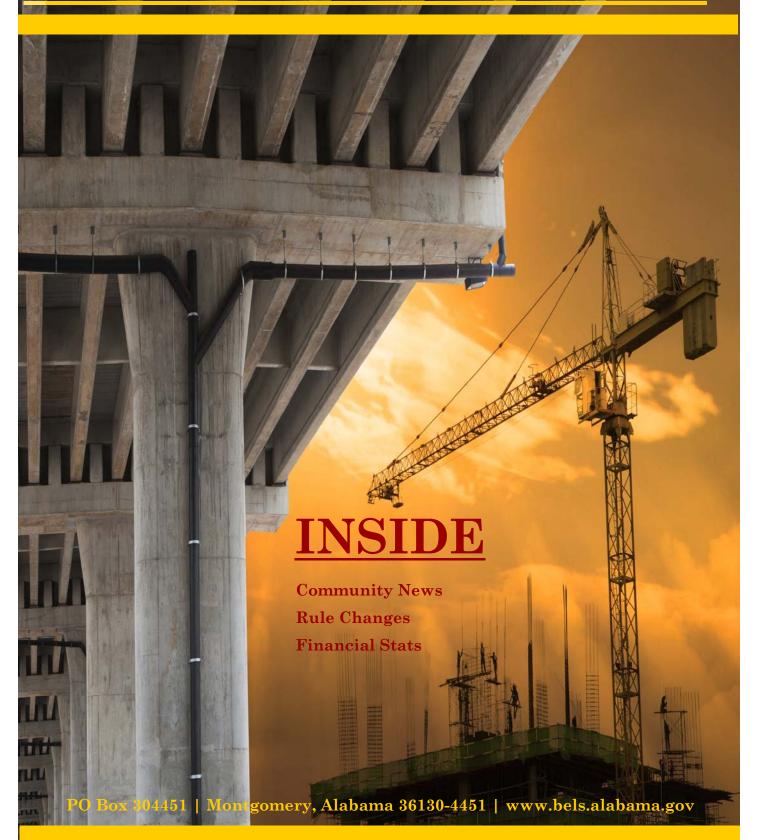
# THE STANDARD

### FROM THE ENFORCEMENT DESK

### Audit, Then and Now

Throughout the years we have been asked why we conduct an audit and if it's even needed in the first place. In the past an audit took place a few months after a renewal cycle. Approximately 5% of the renewed licensees were selected for audit via a computer process. Also, in the past the Board staff who reviewed those selected for audit were provided with a wide variety of documents to show the licensee earned the required continuing education hours for renewal. These documents included everything from hotel receipts, airline tickets, receipts from a conference, training schedule, etc... Many times, it would take months to complete the review process of these audits. Most years there would be several licensees that did not comply with gaining the appropriate number of continuing education hours as required to renew, and an investigation would be opened regarding their conduct.



In past audits both professional engineers and professional land surveyors have been found to have blatantly ignored the required continuing education hours as required by the law and code. The investigation that resulted would go through its processes and ultimately the licensee would be held accountable for their actions with disciplinary action taken against their license.

From start to finish the audit process to include the investigation could take from four to six months. This is very taxing for the limited Board investigative staff that is charged with both the audit evaluations as well as the more comprehensive investigations.

In 2014 the requirements for the type of documents required to show completion of continuing education courses changed. The Administrative Code Section 330-X-13-.02 (12) now states: Records - The responsibility of maintaining records which can be used to support credits claimed is the responsibility of the licensee. Records required are **completion certificates** showing PDH credits earned. These records must be maintained for a period of four years and copies must be furnished, if requested, to the Board for audit verification purposes. These records should not be furnished with the renewal application."

The audit process was evaluated by Board staff over the years to simplify the process as well as make it easier for all licensees. As of October 5, 2021, a new Board Licensing Management System was implemented and changes to the audit process have been integrated into the new system. You will be notified during the renewal process if you are selected for audit. When you get to the step regarding continuing education hours it will require you to: log the training, the number of hours earned, and upload a certificate of completion.

### FROM THE ENFORCEMENT DESK

#### David Alan Milstead - Case # 2020-22

An investigation determined David Milstead, a licensed architect, performed engineering services for two projects in the State of Alabama that included engineering work that was more than incidental to the practice of engineering.

Mr. Milstead agreed to a consent order that required him to pay a \$1,500 civil penalty to the State of Alabama General Fund, to pay the Board \$300 for the cost of the investigation, and the consent order and final order would be public records.

### **Ronald J. Lott - Case # 2021-10**

An investigation determined Ronald J. Lott, an unlicensed individual, entered into an agreement with a client to provide construction services for a commercial remodel project in Alabama. Mr. Lott represented that in the past he had been an engineer and architect, and created design plans that were submitted to structural, mechanical and electrical professional engineers for their review, signature and professional seal.

Mr. Lott agreed to a consent order that required him to pay a \$3,500 civil penalty to the State of Alabama General Fund, to pay the Board \$192 for the cost of the investigation, to cease and desist the practice of engineering until he is issued a professional engineer license by the Board, and the consent order and final order would be public records.

#### Bobby G. Bailey, PE - Case # 2021- 16

An investigation determined that between December 2019 and December 2020, Bobby Bailey, professional engineer, submitted multiple Applications for Permits to Install a Small Flow Onsite Sewage Disposal System to the Health Department that contained errors and inaccurate information.

Mr. Bailey agreed to a consent order that required him to pay a \$1,000 fine to the Board, to submit a monthly list of clients with the understanding that clients will be selected from the list to determine if the work performed is compliant with the standards of practice for engineering, to complete two Board approved educational courses for the Installation of Small Flow Onsite Sewage Disposal Systems and the associated guidelines required by the Alabama Department of Public Health, and the consent order and final order would be public records.

### **Bobby G. Bailey, PE - Case # 2021-16**

for engineering, to complete two Board approved educational courses for the Installation of Small Flow Onsite Sewage Disposal Systems and the associated guidelines required by the Alabama Department of Public Health, and the consent order and final order would be public records.

#### Taylor & Viola Structural Engineers - Case # 2021-33

An investigation determined the firm, Taylor & Viola Structural Engineers, offered engineering services for five projects in the State of Alabama without being issued a certificate of authorization for engineering by the Board.

The firm agreed to a consent order that required it to pay a \$3,000 civil penalty to the State of Alabama General Fund, to pay the Board \$42 for the cost of the investigation, and the consent order and final order would be public records.

### RULE CHANGES

Part of moving to the new Licensing Management System required changes to the format in which documents are submitted to the Board. The language in the rules now refers to a different format that matches the new processes. The rule changes updated the following:

- PE and PLS License Applications
- EI and LSI Certificate Applications
- Certificate of Authorization Applications
- Structural Engineer Roster Designation Requests
- Complaints

#### 330-X-3-.01 Form of Application for Certification and Licensure

(1) All applications for licensure shall be made on a printed form or in the format provided by the Board and no applications made otherwise will be accepted. Applications must be clearly typewritten or computer printed and all questions must be accurately and thoroughly answered. An application not properly completed, containing all the information required, or accompanied by the required fee will be returned with a statement of the reason for return not be accepted. As per Section 34-11-5(e), Code of Ala. 1975, application fees will not be refunded.

#### 330-X-4-.01 Method of Payment

(1) Fees that are paid to the Board shall be made payable to the "Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors Fund". Fees paid to the Board should be made by checks (personal, company or cashier's), credit cards or money orders. No cash or money transfers will be accepted as payment of fees. Applications not accompanied by the proper fee will be returned to the applicant not be accepted.

Once you have entered the required number of hours for renewal and completed the rest of the renewal process it will be sent electronically to a Board Investigator for review. The investigator will review all information and documents associated with the audit and if they find an issue with any of the entered information, they will send an inquiry back to you to answer. This may include you having to provide additional documentation for the listed training. Once you have supplied all needed information back to the investigator it will once again be evaluated. If the audit information is accepted, then the renewal application will be authorized, and you will be notified that your renewal has been accepted. If the reviewer does not accept the returned documentation as information that would support the training hours listed, then you would be notified that the information was rejected. You would then need to provide additional information for the continuing education hours listed; or earn additional continuing education hours to replace that rejected training course. If a course you reported is rejected, you will have 90 days to replace it with another course.

The new system has significantly expedited the audit process and will reduce the number of investigations regarding the continuing education requirements.

### 330-X-6-.01 Qualifying Experience

In evaluating experience offered as qualifying experience under Section 34-11-4 (1), (2) and (3), Code of Ala. 1975, the Board will take into consideration the following:

- (a) Experience must be progressive and of an increasing standard of quality and responsibility and usually follows graduation.
- (b) Professional land surveyor applicants will usually gain experience by working under the supervision of a licensed professional land surveyor. Verification of experience must be by the licensed professional land surveyor associate, or in some other relationship that assures the Board that the experience received is substantially equivalent to supervision under a licensed professional land surveyor. It is the responsibility of the applicant to have the verification forms provided in the application package completed and returned directly to the Board by the applicant. See Rule 330-X-3-.01(4).
- (c) Professional Engineer applicants will usually gain experience by working under the supervision of a licensed professional engineer. Experience may also be gained by working with a licensed professional engineer who closely observed the applicant's work as an associate within the same company and the same location. Verification of experience must be by the licensed professional engineer supervisor, the licensed professional engineer associate, or in some other relationship that assures the Board that the experience received is substantially equivalent to supervision under a licensed professional engineer. It is the responsibility of the applicant to have the verification forms provided in the application package completed and returned directly to the Board by the applicant. See Rule 330-X-3-.01(4).
- (d) Concurrent time, that is time spent in engineering or land surveying work, while attending school, can only be credited as education experience or work experience but not as both.

### RULE CHANGES

#### 330-X-15-.02 Application Procedures.

(1) All applications for certificates of authorization shall be made on a printed form or in the format provided by the Board and no applications made otherwise will be accepted. An application not properly completed, containing all of the information required, or accompanied by the required fee will be returned with a statement of the reason for return. not be accepted. As per Section 34-11-5(e), Code of Ala. 1975, application fees will not be refunded.

### 330-X-16-.01 Complaints.

The Board may initiate action in cases where a person's actions or business entity's actions are in violation of the law. Complaints must be filed within two years of the date the violation occurred or within two years of the date of the discovery of the violation but no later than 10 years from the date of the violation. Any violation that was caused by fraud, deceit, or concealment, however, is not subject to the 10-year time limitation. Upon receipt of a signed written complaint from any person that an individual has violated the law and/or the rules of the Board, the Board may assemble the facts, obtain legal guidance, follow the case to completion based on the legal guidance given and begin administrative action, levy a civil administrative penalty, file a civil action, and/or refer the matter for criminal prosecution.

(1) A complaint initiated by an individual or entity against a licensee or nonlicensee shall be <u>submitted in a format provided by the Board</u> in writing and shall contain:

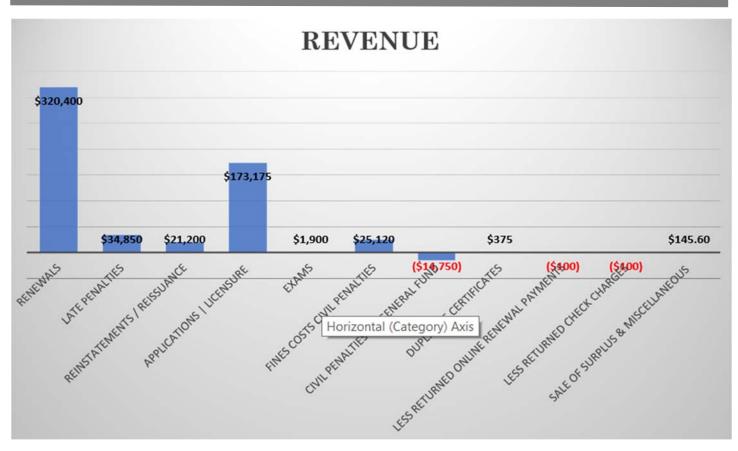

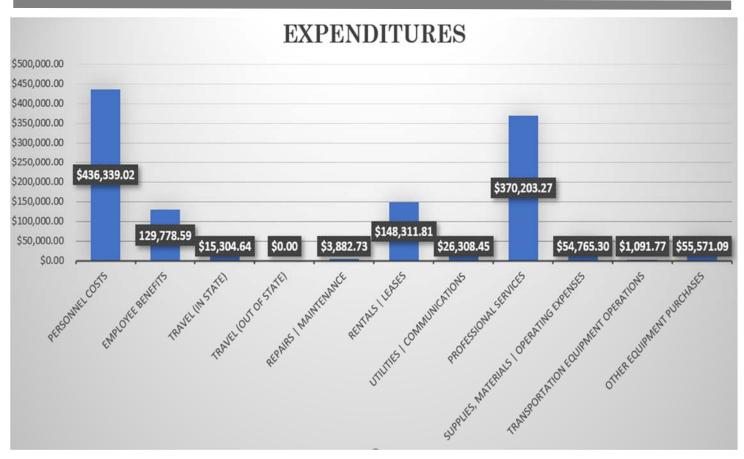

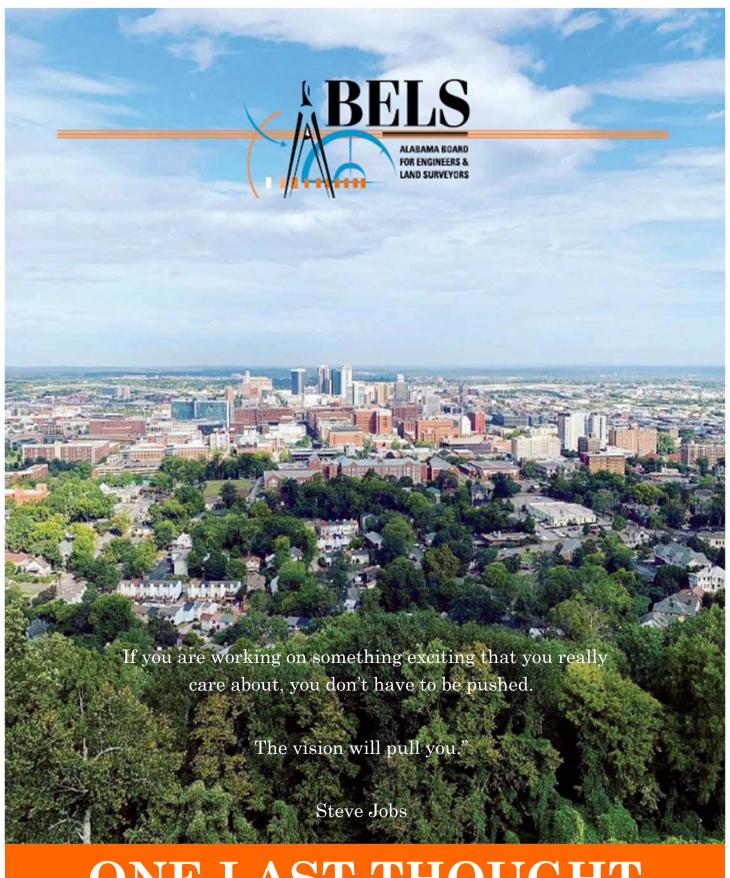
