BOARD INFORMATION


- BELS is comprised of nine members. Five professional engineers, two professional land surveyors, and two public members.




National Surveyors Week March 20 - 26

HELP WANTED

“Help Wanted” signs are everywhere these days and the Board is no exception.

I’ll get back to that in a moment, but first let me send a **Great Big Thank You!!!** to the professional engineers and professional land surveyors serving as Board Technical Advisors who currently provide so much of their time assisting the Board to conduct fair and impartial investigations. This work is essential when an allegation has been made that a professional may have acted outside their area of competency.

Now that being said, - We need more Advisors.

What does an Advisor do? Here is a general overview of the process:

A review of the questioned documents is conducted by the Advisor at their location. If possible, an Advisor residing in a different geographic region of the State than where the alleged violation occurred is selected to review the design plans or survey documents for violations of the applicable standards of practice. The Advisor provides a review of the documents, then submits a report to the Investigator. The subject of the investigation is then provided a copy of the report with the Advisor’s identification removed. The Subject can provide a response to the report and that response is submitted to the Advisor for review. The Advisor then notifies the Investigator if the information provided by the Subject changed their opinion.

If the matter must be presented at a formal hearing the Advisor would be subpoenaed to testify at the hearing. Formal hearings requiring an Advisor to attend are rare; but they do happen. If subpoenaed the advisor is eligible for reimbursement for mileage and overnight per diem at the applicable state rate.

The Board understands there will be times when an Advisor may not have sufficient time to commit to a review. Simply let us know and another Advisor will be selected.

A perk - Advisors can earn up to 10 pdh per year for the work they do for the Board.

POLICY CHANGE

At its March 8, 2022 meeting the Board determined to revise its policy regarding qualifying licensure experience gained via “Remote Supervision”. The updated policy is on the Board’s website in the “Applications” area. It states the following:

“While it cannot be disputed that the benefits of face-to-face mentoring and supervision of engineer or land surveyor interns cannot be overemphasized; it is also recognized that a certain degree of benefit can be realized through mentoring and supervision by using electronic communication platforms. With the need to conduct business not only in person, but virtual interaction with business clients becoming more acceptable and necessary in today’s business climate, the use of technological communication tools have become a necessity in modern business interactions. This is true not only for client interactions, but it is also essential for employee communication and training.

The Board will recognize remote supervision of engineers and land surveyors, but only on a case-by-case basis.

- An active formal training and supervision plan must be developed by a company wishing to employ remote supervision techniques, that describes, in detail, the methodologies to be employed for remote supervision, the frequency of in person face-to-face interaction, and the frequency of virtual contact between the engineer and/or land surveyor intern and the supervisor.
- The company will be responsible for implementing and maintaining a plan that is consistent for all interns, guides the intern towards progressive knowledge and responsibility, and shall include a requirement stating that a majority of the supervised training shall be in person face-to-face interaction.
- Documented evidence must be provided to the Board that clearly shows adherence to the remote supervision plan demonstrates increased responsibility.”

our MISSION

The Alabama Board of Licensure for Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors was established by legislative action in 1935. Its charter is to protect the public by helping to safeguard life, health, and property, and to promote the public welfare by providing for the licensing and regulation of persons in the practices of engineering and land surveying.

This purpose is achieved through the establishment of minimum qualifications for entry into the professions of engineering and land surveying, through the adoption of rules defining and delineating unlawful or unethical conduct, and through discipline for those individuals or entities who violate the applicable laws or rules.

FROM THE ENFORCEMENT DESK

Truth or Consequences?

When the Alabama Board of Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors receives an application for licensure it goes through a review process. In the past, the applications were submitted by paper and the numerous pages were evaluated by hand.

The licensure application was somewhat limited on the amount of wording/clarification that could be provided on the form. At times an individual would answer “No” if they had been arrested for a misdemeanor/felony when they actually had been but due to the lack of space for additional clarification language in the question this was erroneously interpreted by the applicant.

The background review process for all applicants has been standard with our agency for nearly 20 years. In reviewing the applicants background history, the Board staff process each applicant through Alacourt, Accurint (once known as LexisNexis), and NCEES Enforcement Exchange to verify if they had any criminal or disciplinary actions taken against them. This is compared to the answers the applicant has provided on their application.

If during the process a red flag arises from what is discovered by the background check then that information is forwarded to the Board’s investigators for a more in-depth evaluation. The investigators research the listed jurisdictions for any criminal disposition of cases as well as reach out to any of those governmental agencies for documentation. The investigators will also contact any listed state boards that disciplinary action was taken to gain additional information.

The Board purchased a new database system that went operational in October 2021. The application process is now fully automatic. During the new application process, the applicant is provided with more detailed clarification instructions and are advised and asked numerous questions to include the following:

Instructions:

You are required to read all questions in their entirety. All States do not ask the same questions. **Background checks are performed on all applicants.** Any misrepresentation or untrue statements will be cause for an **Automatic 1-year denial** of your application, **regardless if unintentional.**

Additional Instructions:

On the next page is a list of actions that are misdemeanors and should be reported (this is not a complete list, if you are unsure if the action is a misdemeanor, you would need to contact the Board office)

DUI / DWI

Reckless driving with or without alcohol

Open Container

Alcohol - minor buying alcohol or providing alcohol to minor

Hunting on baited field. Hunting at night, Overlimit

Overlimit on waterfowl or fish, illegal catch of fish

The questions asked concerning disciplinary actions are as follows:

“Have you ever been disciplined or do you have any complaints pending against you in another jurisdiction? Have you ever been disciplined or do you have any complaints pending against you in another jurisdiction? Have you ever been convicted, plead guilty, placed on probation, had adjudication withheld, accepted pre-trial diversion for a felony or misdemeanor?”

Depending on what is discovered during this process several things can occur. First the information will be reported back to the licensing staff for their determination on what happens with the application. The staff may ask for additional documentation and clarification from the applicant for what was discovered. Depending on the response the applicant may find out as stated above “Any misrepresentation or untrue statements will be cause for an Automatic 1-year denial of your application, regardless of if unintentional.”

The information that was uncovered may also lead to opening an investigation into the conduct of the applicant. Enforcement cases in the past that were originated from initial application have led to several disciplinary actions for performing engineering / land surveying in Alabama without a license.

The moral of this story is to be truthful. As one who is applying for licensure should expect that their answers will be reviewed, and background checks may uncover wrong doings of one’s past. Not all disciplinary actions or criminal actions will keep you from gaining licensure but answering wrong because you forgot or didn’t know it was a misdemeanor or your secretary or wife wasn’t aware of the action, lying, or assuming it won’t be found will delay licensure for a year.

FROM THE ENFORCEMENT DESK

James Cameron Thorne - Case # 2021-12

An investigation determined that in 2019, James Cameron Thorne, a professional engineer, prepared a structural design for the roof of a commercial building that utilized bar joists 3' 0" O.C. with purling hookers 2' 0" P.T. 2x4 purlings, 26 gauge Galvalume roof panels, and Galvalume sidewall flashing. Architectural information appeared in the background of the drawing with the structural roof design. Mr. Thorne did not clarify on his drawings that his PE stamp was only related to the roof system and not the architectural information. The absence of this clarification would lead someone to interpret that his PE stamp was also meant to approve the architectural information on the plan.

Mr. Thorne agreed to a consent order that required him to pay a \$2,000 fine to the Board, to pay the Board \$303 for the cost of the investigation, and the consent order and final order would be public records.

Fred Hollon, PLS - Case # 2021-23 and 2021-25

In December 2020 (Case No. 2021-23) Mr. Hollon failed to properly review deed information involving a survey he performed. A Board Technical Advisor (BTA) reviewed the documents related to the surveying services he performed and provided a report that indicated the survey bearing his professional seal and signature contained errors and inaccurate information.

In October 2019 (Case 2021-25) Mr. Hollon performed a survey of property and the documents related to the surveying services he performed were reviewed by a BTA. The Advisor provided a report that indicated the survey bearing Mr. Hollon's professional seal and signature contained errors and inaccurate information.

Mr. Hollon agreed to a consent order that required him to voluntarily surrender his professional land surveyor license and that it would not be eligible for reissuance, to pay the Board \$125 for the cost of the investigation, and the consent order and final order would be public records.

Allen Engineering Corporation - Case # 2021-32

An investigation determined Allen Engineering Corporation, an un-certificated firm, provided engineering design drawings for a project in Alabama. These documents contained the firm's name in the title block on the structural, electrical, plumbing and mechanical sections of the design drawings during a time when the firm did not possess a certificate of authorization for engineering issued by the Board.

The firm agreed to a consent order that required it to pay a \$1,000 civil penalty to the State of Alabama General Fund, to pay the Board \$100 for the cost of the investigation, and the consent order and final order would be public records.

FROM THE ENFORCEMENT DESK

SE Consultants Inc - Case # 2022-03

An investigation determined SE Consultants Inc, an un-certificated firm, provided engineering design drawings for ten projects in Alabama without being issued a certificate of authorization for engineering from the Board which would authorize the firm to offer or provide engineering services in the State of Alabama.

The firm agreed to a consent order that required it to pay a \$5,500 civil penalty to the State of Alabama General Fund, to pay the Board \$40 for the cost of the investigation, and the consent order and final order would be public records.

Gartek Engineering Corp - Case # 2022-10

An investigation determined Gartek Engineering Corp, an un-certificated firm, provided engineering design drawings for a project in Alabama without being issued a certificate of authorization for engineering from the Board which would authorize the firm to offer or provide engineering services in the State of Alabama.

The firm agreed to a consent order that required it to pay a \$1,000 civil penalty to the State of Alabama General Fund, to pay the Board \$100 for the cost of the investigation, and the consent order and final order would be public records.

CERTIFICATES OF AUTHORIZATION

The Board has seen a rise in the number of violations by firms failing to obtain a certificate of authorization for engineering or land surveying prior to offering and/or providing services in the State of Alabama. When an individual is granted initial licensure in Alabama they are sent an email that has links to information regarding seals and certificates of authorization. A portion of the Certificate of authorization information in the link follows:

What is a Certificate of Authorization or also referred to as a CA?


It is a certificate that authorizes companies to perform or offer to perform engineering and/or land surveying services in Alabama. Section 34-11-9(a)(1), Code of Alabama 1975 states any firm offering or performing engineering and/or land surveying services in the State of Alabama may only do so after the issuance of a Certificate of Authorization from the Alabama Board of Licensure for Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors.

When do I need to apply for a Certificate of Authorization?

If you are employed by a firm that will offer or perform engineering and/or land surveying services in the State of Alabama, and the firm does not currently hold a Certificate of Authorization issued by the Alabama Board, the firm must submit an application for a Certificate of Authorization within 30 days of your notification that licensure has been granted. If this is not accomplished, the firm is in violation of the Code of Alabama and could be subject to disciplinary action from the Board.
